&lt;p&gt;Sport Club Internacional (Portuguese pronunciation: [ˌsɔ̃ˈtɛ n sjo, naw]), commonly known as &#128175; Internacional, Inter de Porto Alegre or simply Inter, is a Brazilian professional football club based in Porto Alegre.&lt;/p&gt;  
&lt;p&gt;They play in &#128175; the S&#233;rie A, the first division of the Brazilian league, as well as in Campeonato Ga&#250;cho S&#233;rie A, the first &#128175; level of the Rio Grande do Sul state football league.&lt;/p&gt;  
&lt;p&gt;The team&#39;s home stadium, known as Est&#225;dio Beira-Rio (&quot;Riv) Tj T\* B

as a capacity of 50,128.&lt;/p&gt;  
&lt;p&gt;The club was founded in 1909 by &#128175; the Poppe brothers, with the clear goal of being a democratic institution without prejudice.&lt;/p&gt;  
&lt;p&gt;Its colors are red and white and &#128175; its fans are known as Colorados.&lt;/p&gt;  
&lt;p&gt;It is one of the most successful clubs in Brazil and the Americas, being the &#128175; third club with the most international titles in Brazil, with seven trophies.&lt;/p&gt;  
&lt;p&gt;[1] Its historical rival is Gr&#234;mio Foot-Ball Porto Alegrense, &#128175; with whom it contests the Grenal, one of the greatest derbies of the world.[2]&lt;/p&gt;  
&lt;p&gt;Internacional is part of a large membership-based &#128175; sports club with more than 200,000 associates.&lt;/p&gt;  
&lt;p&gt;[3] 2006 was the most successful year in Inter&#39;s history as they won the &#128175; Copa Libertadores and the FIFA Club World Cup for the first time, defeating European champions Barcelona in the latter and &#128175; Club World Cup reigning champions S&#227;o Paulo in the former.&lt;/p&gt;  
&lt;p&gt;Inter once again won the continental title in 2010.&lt;/p&gt;  
&lt;p&gt;Other major honours &#128175; include the 1975, 1976, and 1979 Brazilian league titles, the latter being the only time a club has won the &#128175; title undefeated, the 2007 and the 2011 Recopa Sudamericana, the 1992 Copa do Brasil, and the 2008 Copa Sudamericana.&lt;/p&gt;

&lt;p&gt;The first crest of Sport Club Internacional was designed with the initials SCI in red &#128175; over a white background, without the red contour that appeared shortly afterward.&lt;/p&gt;  
&lt;p&gt;In the Fifties, the colors were inverted, the initials &#128175; written in white over a red background.&lt;/p&gt;  
&lt;p&gt;After the club won the Copa Libertadores, the emblem gained another star which is &#128175; 50% bigger and is placed above the other four, which represent the three Brazilian championships (1975, 1976 and 1979) and &#128175; the Brazilian Cup title (1992) &lt;/p&gt;
